Welcome back! I do hope that you had a memorable winter break. As you know, another semester is underway at WRHS and it is shaping up to be as eventful as the last! Winter sports and activities are in full swing and classes are going well!

A very important upcoming event that I would like to direct your attention to is Student Led-Conferences. They will occur on Wednesday and Thursday, February 7 and 8 respectively. Conference times are:

- Thursday, February 8, 12:00 3:00 p.m.

One of the most important things that you can do as a parent to help your child achieve is to not only establish regular and open communication with their teachers, but also become informed about what courses and programs your student most enjoys and the ways in which high school experiences and opportunities can and will relate to post-secondary success. Our Student-Led Conferences afford students and parents the opportunity for this very thing, alongside their Advisory Teacher. The primary focus for spring conferences will consist of students' reflections of the courses they've taken and the courses in which they are planning to take next school year. Students will talk to parents about their individualized 4-year Plan of Study, share their academic and personal goals, and provide parents with a comprehensive report that details potential career interests, post-secondary education options, colleges of interest and student transcripts. I would also encourage you to share any other information about your child that would assist us in better understanding their needs.

We plan to offer the same scheduling opportunities as we did in October through our scheduling platform, myconferencetime.com. Students will sign up during their advisory class for their Student-Led Conference during the week of January 22nd. Beginning January 29th, you will have the opportunity to schedule with as many of your student's other teachers as you need to. 15-minute appointments will be available and you'll have the opportunity to choose virtual or in-person meetings. Our Counseling and Administrative Staffs will also be listed on myconferencetime.com and available during conferences. Please do not hesitate to schedule with one of us.

As we move closer to the end of the third 9-weeks, we are aware that some students may be struggling. Tuesday/Thursday Interventions continue and are a great opportunity for students who need more time on campus to work. If your child is referred by our staff, we certainly hope you will support our efforts to ensure their success by encouraging attendance. IB CAS Project: Students Help Feed Topeka

What is CAS?

CAS stands for Creativity-Activity-Service and is an essential component of the IB core curriculum. CAS requires that students stretch themselves and grow outside the boundaries of the classroom by asking them to become active, serve the community, and engage in creative activities.

What are some of our students doing for CAS?

Among other activities, each IB diploma candidate must create, develop, and reflect upon one project that incorporates at least two categories of CAS (e.g., creativity and service). They are required to collaborate with others in the community, and many of these projects are developed to support the people of Topeka in some way.



A few WRHS IB diploma candidates have been working hard to support the

mission of one particular local organization: Bee the Blessing. According to the organization's <u>website</u>, "Bee the Blessing, Inc. is a 501c3 non-profit organization, operating for the sole purpose of coordinating food distribution to the Blessing Boxes in Topeka, Kansas. Through a network of dedicated volunteers and donors of food and money, we endeavor to have food in the Boxes on a regular basis."

Bee the Blessing has found at least three such volunteers in WRHS IB seniors Naledi Mackenzie, Sienna Hamilton, and Megan Weis, who have spent the past two years raising funds to repair and fill "Blessing Boxes" around the city. The trio began last year by checking the conditions of donation boxes before repairing and painting them as needed. They have also found the means to fill those boxes. Over the past two years, Megan, Sienna, and Naledi have been awarded nearly \$8,500 from the Stay785 Grant administered by the Topeka Youth Commission. With that money, they have filled and will continue to replenish boxes for the community.

"Bee the Blessing aligns perfectly with my values, and as I learned more about the help this organization provides to the Topeka community, I knew I wanted to be a part of that," said Sienna Hamilton of her motivation for helping the organization. She added, "When we share our time and resources with those in need, we not only help to alleviate hunger and discomfort, but we also build connections and foster a sense of community."

Megan and Naledi emphasized the importance of initiative and teamwork as they reflected on their experiences. "The teamwork involved is one of my favorite aspects of the project. I have learned how to effectively achieve a goal through working together," said Megan Weis on some of her biggest takeaways from working on the project. Her project partner, Naledi, agreed: "Though I have been fortunate enough to do this with my team, doing any type of project requires initiative from each individual. Initiative to get out your ideas, find ways to make it happen, and take the first step in achieving whatever the goal might be."

The students have already recruited others to join them in their efforts to support Bee the Blessing, and they hope to pass the torch to younger students when they graduate in May.

They showed their desire to serve the community by conducting over 350 hours of community service supporting various veteran celebrations around Topeka.

Guest speaker

Jay Tremblay, Assistant Director of Operations talked to students about Chick-fil-A's Personnel and Training. Students were able to learn about the soft skills necessary to become a good employee and ask questions about the day to day operations of Chick Fil A. What helped them to be so successful?



"I learned that before the owner of chick-fil-a started his chicken business he was actually cooking burgers. Chick-fil-a also has about 3,000- 4,000 customers each day! Lastly, you can possibly start working under the age of 16 if you show soft skills like responsibility, hard working, and social skills. "I learned from Jay Tremblay that they serve over 3,000 people every day and they give out a meal every 18 seconds. You can be 14 years old to work there if they think you are a good employee at the interview. You start at \$9.00 an hour. - Work-based Learning. (Workplace Experience) The goal is to increase individualization as students connect their interests, skills, and goals with career possibilities.
